
# EDITOR'S Letter

From then on, script writing for movies and plays informed Wendy's fiction writing. After college, she started teaching English with an eye to becoming a published author down the road. She learned about the hero's journey and tried to incorporate each story with a full plot arc. Wendy is also a member of several excellent writers' groups. Wendy published romance novels and also several romance serials. Becoming a serial writer helped her to write quicker and to master the art of the well-timed cliffhanger.

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### Q: What was your first thought when you started writing and when?

In fourth grade, I begged my parents to buy me a movie camera for my birthday. Of course they bought the camera! I felt so proud and excited! Once I learned how to make films, I used the camera to make a silent movie with one of my best friends, Kristen. I wrote a script and then we filmed the story. We added subtitles and called the story "The Adventures of Myrtle and Gertrude." I am pretty sure since we were kids, the story ended with a pie smashed into someone's face! This was my first attempt at writing and I've never looked back since!

### Q: What literary pilgrimages have you gone on?

About 6 years ago, my family and I visited the grave of the great poet Edgar Allan Poe. My first Edgar Allan Poe poem was Annabelle Lee, and I felt enamoured with his weaving of lost love into every eerie story or poem. My younger sister is a professional writer and our mother is an English teacher and a big gothic horror reader. While on a trip to visit my sister in Washington, DC, we drove up to Baltimore, Maryland, visited Poe's marble and granite grave marker and took pictures. The sun was shining, and we ate at a local mom-and-pop Italian restaurant. I recall getting some great pasta and Limoncello. But most intense, hovering over the day, was the mystical connection with a great American storyteller paving the way for other writers to follow.

### Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

Piracy is definitely a completely harmful practice and just about every writer I know must face it. Finding free copies of your hardwon writing craft put out in a way that dupes customers is disheartening. Most writers work tougher to help each other spot such dubious events and cope with them as effectively as possible under the circumstances.

#### Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

Romance writing and the creative process energize me because I love immersing myself in spicy love stories. The passions and drama of human nature, and the highs and lows of romance, comedy and tragedy are exciting to me. I feel that attraction, that magnetism when I write—time suspends and the world retreats. People make sense of the world by telling stories. Each person weaves a narrative fabric of their own that is both unique and also connects to the larger world of universal experiences. I am passionate about life, love and happy endings.

### Q: What are the common traps for aspiring writers?

Trying to be perfect is a huge mistake. Trying

too hard to make too many beautiful paragraphs with metaphors and antithesis about the moonlight, instead of writing from your heart can be a misstep too. Following your muse down too many rabbit holes and not coming back up for air can also be an obstacle.

#### Q: What is your writing Kryptonite?

If kryptonite is a catchword for an exploitable weakness, then mine would be collecting ideas like leaves falling from a tree and then stashing them half-formed somewhere. Inside my many tote bags, I nestle gel pens, journals full of doodles and lists, free writes, or partial story ideas. Full of fancy, I veer down each path for a while and try on for size what that story will become, much like trying on endless pairs of designer heels or trying out sexy new cocktails and vintage wines. I can get lost!

### Q: What does literary success look like to you?

Success is about using best practices and expressing myself. Sure, part of success is money, but writing is my passion, so it never feels like a job. I do set smart goals for myself on progress, so success measures change each year.

#### Q: How many unpublished and halffinished books do you have?

That is such a hilarious question because all my writer friends and I have a variety of unpublished stories. Sometimes to kill time instead of writing, we have to go back and count them to compare. Of course, to answer this question, I still looked around in my various writing notes and journals to answer. Drum roll, please! I have six unfinished stories right now.

### Q: How long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

The old writer's cliche is true—write about what you know. I may spend a few days researching a niche area before writing if I need to. I like to write about a setting where I have spent a significant amount of time, but that is not always possible. I loved writing the story Capitol Fever because I lived in Austin for 5 years. I felt like reliving the fun of the place. Right now though, I am writing a romantic suspense story set in the middle east, and I have not been there. This story deals with military protectors, so the story required more research on that setting and topic.

It is a great young adult novel that starts off as a series about a brother and sister who need to go to extreme lengths in order to save multiple worlds. Prue is the daughter of a mortal and a magic wielder, giving her the unique ability to see what is happening in two different worlds. She understands that the Underworld and the Overworld are in constant conflict and that the Underworld has tipped the scales and is winning the war.

#### **ABOUT THE BOOK**

The battle between the Underworld, full of darkness, and the Overworld, full of light, has been evenly balanced for millennia. Caught between them is the mortal world, where humans have become so afraid of magic they cannot understand or control that they allow the Occult to rule them. After the Occult joins forces with the Underworld, the balance shifts and the Overworld is decimated. But still, in the mortal world, the magic won't die. It appears when a supernatural being and a human have a child, like Prue.

This is the first volume in an epic new fantasy series that spans the three richly detailed worlds as Prue, her non-magical half-brother Everett, and all Magic Users, fight to survive. 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### Q: What was your first thought when you started writing and when?

When I started writing The Reign of the Occult, which is a YA fantasy novel, I wrote only the first five thousand words and came back to it years later. I wanted to prove I could complete a whole book and it expanded from there. It's strange it's now published, as that had not the intention when I started.

### Q: What literary pilgrimages have you gone on?

When I decided to start writing as a job rather than a hobby – it completely changed my approach. I have become much more disciplined, and I concentrate on getting the words out first – before I start worrying about editing anything. It's something I must do rather than an option, and not surprisingly, I am much quicker now!

### Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

It can be whom you know, rather than what you know.

#### Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

A bit of both. There's nothing better than getting ideas flowing and having everything come together in your head and then on the page. I find it hard to stop writing when I'm in the zone and I enjoy doing it – even when I'm supposed to be having to time off. Sometimes I need to stop and disengage.

### Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

If you try waiting for the perfect time, or for the perfect circumstances, to get writing and publishing, you can end up waiting forever. Just get going, one step at a time and progress builds from there. Suddenly you find you are further along than you first thought, and everything has added up.

#### Q: Does a big ego help or hurt writers?

To improve at anything in life, you must be able to take on criticism. Few manuscripts come out perfect the first try. You must revise it, take on feedback and make the necessary improvements. Confidence and faith are good when writers face rejection, but you also need to be adaptable.

#### Q: What is your writing Kryptonite?

I write the bits of a novel that I like first, which means I don't always write in chronological order. It is probably the least efficient way of doing things and I don't think writers would normally recommend it. Particularly for The Reign of the Occult – I went backwards and forwards on it all the time.

#### Q: Have you ever gotten a Reader's block?

I'm normally a quick reader, but I struggle every time with A Heart of Darkness by Joseph

Conrad. The book is only small, and I have about 3 copies, yet I still can't finish it. It was for a school English project, & I did not get it.

### Q: Do you ever consider writing under a pseudonym?

Yes, I do write under a pseudonym. Hazel is my grandmother's maiden name.

### Q: Do you try to be original or deliver readers what they want?

I love reading YA novels, so I just wrote what I would like! I already have the sequel, The Queen of the Underworld, written so it's not based on any audience feedback. When I sat down to write it one day, it all came to me in one go.

### Q: How many unpublished and half-finished books do you have?

The Reign of the Occult is now published and released. Its sequel, The Queen of the Underworld, is complete but not edited – due out in November 2022. I also have The Burning Bandit (a standalone) which I haven't published yet but is all done. I will be releasing them over the course of the next couple of years.

### Q: What does literary success look like to you?

Obviously, you want people to like your work, but more than that, I want to create something I'm proud of. To build a collection of books that I would purchase and love. While I love YA novels, eventually I do want to write a novel for adults – to test my skills!

### Q: What's the best way to market your books?

As a debut author, I am still figuring this out. I think it's trying things out and seeing what works for you and your novels. As well as social media, I've been using professional promotors, advertisements, and entering competitions. If anyone has any tips, then let me know.

### Q: How long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

My debut novel, The Reign of the Occult, is a fantasy novel with folklore elements, so I did a lot of research. Rather than doing it beforehand, however, I did it while I was writing – during a five-year period. The Burning Bandit (currently unpublished) I researched for about six months beforehand. Research is my favourite activity!

#### Q: How do you feel about being featured in

It feels very strange after so long writing it! But exciting too, like the start of a new journey. I just hope that people give The Reign of the Occult a try and that they like it. The best bit about writing is knowing people understand and enjoy what you're trying to portray.

### Q: What was your first thought when you started writing and when?

When I first started writing, I was halfway through rehab. During that time, I could focus on bettering myself for my kids, me, and the future I wanted them to have. When I first started writing, I thought it was a way to put my energy into something other than drinking until I blacked out.

### Q: What literary pilgrimages have you gone on?

A pilgrimage that I have gone on has been figuring out what makes my characters tick. What they would do in a certain situation, how they handle themselves, and understanding even the minutia of details that helps the reader connect with any character. If the reader can relate on a deeper level, then they have a desire to finish the novel.

### Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

That's a good question! I think when you lose the person you once were, and forget where you came from, then the will to go to areas deemed unethical become justifiable. The boundaries that you were willing to cross take you away from the person that readers connected with in the first place.

#### Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

At times writing energizes me when I'm sucked into the story, and I want to know what is going to happen next. When this happens the usual three or four pages become nine or ten pages and I find myself writing an entire chapter within a few hours. The times writing exhausts me is when I edit my work.

### Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

A common trap that comes to mind is thinking that the novel is going to get picked up instantly, or that the novel will be known immediately. This is a trap for the mind of a writer when they think that the world of writing is smaller than it truthfully is. This conflict can dampen the writer's spirits.

#### Q: Does a big ego help or hurt writers?

As a writer, you must be willing to "kill your darlings," meaning some parts of the book might have to be removed. I feel with a big ego, justifying your reasoning why leaving stuff in can hinder the potential of the novel. I think being consistent is more important than being right and an ego could affect this.

#### Q: What is your writing Kryptonite?

My kryptonite has been procrastination. Instead of spreading the work throughout the days, I end up holding the work off until the day or two days before it is due. In school, I could finish assignments in a few days, instead, I would

cram the work into that night and would end up with an unsatisfied grade.

### Q: Do you ever consider writing under a pseudonym?

I did consider it. When I had written a few short stories I thought about using a pseudonym that had a nice ring to it. I wanted to go under the name of Wade Winchester. When I discussed it with my creative writing teacher, he gave excellent advice and reminded me that Ian Fleming wrote James Bond.

### Q: Do you try to be original or deliver readers what they want?

I want to be original. "Original" means a story that is written by you with your creative writing skills. This story shouldn't be copied from any author. I don't want to write a story that I am unable to connect to as well as pour my heart and soul into the story. If I wrote what others wanted me to write, then the joy of creating would be sucked out of why I started writing in the first place.

#### Q: How many unpublished and halffinished books do you have?

I have an unpublished short story that I wrote as I was writing Legacy. I wrote about a lonely boy who created a robot who was his only friend. I wrote just to write it then placed it in a document for safekeeping. Besides the short story, Legacy was the first story I have written and wanted to publish.

### Q: What does literary success look like to you?


To me, literary success is hearing readers have enjoyed the book. That they could connect with the characters, and they took something away from the novel. When I read and hear reviews about Legacy, it reassures me that it wasn't all for nothing. I can also connect with readers and know that we have dealt with similarities in our lives.

### Q: How long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I prefer to not research before writing the book. I want to jump in and begin the story and see where it is going to take me. I like to say that I am a vessel for the characters and story as they come to life. If I do any research, it is for accuracy and for clarification.

### **CLUBBED TWO**

#### BY AUTHOR ROBERT KARL

Clubbed Two: Anxiety, Anger, Activism by Robert Karl is the second book in his powerful and poignant historical fiction trilogy. Set in Philadelphia between 1982 to 1992 as the AIDS pandemic begins its assault, the story centers around Joey and Henry, lovers and owners of Club Sanctuary, and the diverse cast of characters who frequent their club. Their stories range from funny, and fabulous to tragic, but each character is merely attempting to make their way in a world filled with hate, fear and heartbreak.

#### **ABOUT THE BOOK**

CLUBBED TWO is historical fiction, set in Philadelphia PA from 1982 to 1992. A love story is included, but this is not your typical gay romance novel. It's his second book in a planned three-part series exploring LGBTQ history and culture.

Much of the story is told in a first-person narrative by Joey, the owner of Club Sanctuary. Joey and his Henry, continue to develop relationship as they build the club into a huge success. However, in order to provide greater insights into the words, thoughts and actions of various characters, the author often moves into a third-person narrative. This allows the reader to dive more deeply into the stories of characters whom Joey might not know at all. This format allows Club Sanctuary to be a metaphor for the greater LGBTQ community, without limiting the scope of the story. LGBTQ Pride; Diversity; Disability Awareness and Acceptance; Interracial Love; 1980s Queer Fashions and Fads; Ageism, Infidelity, and AIDS Activism.

Historical references are made as the characters attend the Gay Games, view the AIDS Memorial Quilt, or learn about the deaths of celebrities, AIDS activists and advocates, co-workers and friends. Others get involved with real-life organizations, such as ACT UP, as they struggle to fight against indifference and ignorance.

Readers have described the book as profound, poignant, fun, spicy, hilarious and as an amazing book with important stories. Come along for the ride and experience life in the true spirit of the Queer community.



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### Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

For the CLUBBED series, which are my first novels, I wanted to share positive stories of LGBTQ characters, starting before the AIDS pandemic and continuing into the 21st Century. It was important for the stories to be authentic and reflect the realities of LGBTQ life. I started the work at the beginning of the COVID pandemic.

### Q: What do you like to write about the most?

Queer characters find joy in life and accept themselves, even as they sometimes face adversity and obstacles. The overall theme of my books is to celebrate the diversity of Queer culture. I find empathy with characters who don't easily fit into the mold of the expectations of others.

#### Q: What does your book emphasize?

Club Sanctuary is a metaphor for the greater LGBTQ world, exploring both positive and negative aspects of the characters' lives. The positive, long-lasting interracial relationship between the two main characters provides a focus for the other stories. Accepting ourselves and others as we are is a major emphasis.

### Q: What book or childhood author had the greatest impact on you?

I first read the works of James Baldwin many years ago, and I still re-read his works. His prose is brilliant. I recommend him to anyone who enjoys great literature. In CLUBBED TWO, the characters pay homage to Baldwin with a mural outside the club.

### Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

I have no direct experience with the publishing industry because my books are self-published. When I first looked for a publisher, they wanted me to wait much too long for them to make a decision. I would like to see the industry be more receptive to new authors from any age group and include more diverse voices.

#### Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

Writing energizes me! I get excited to tell the stories and see where the characters take me. I don't do any outlines or construct elaborate maps for where the stories will go. For me, that's part of the energy and excitement, to travel along with the characters.

# Q: What have been some of the most exciting changes you have seen with regard to support for LGBT youth and what do you hope to see in the future?

We now see ourselves represented more frequently in all types of media, which is

encouraging LGBTQ youth. There's still a long way to go and in some cases, we are now meeting strong resistance. More tolerance and acceptance are needed. And I want more stories with LGBTQ characters in all sorts of settings, including dramas, comedies, fantasies, etc.

# Q: We hear stories about exclusion, harassment, bullying, and other struggles of LGBTQ youth. How do you deal with the critics?

The hatred never went away, though it seemed to subside somewhat for a few years. Now, in places like the US, people openly state their hatred of us and promote violence against us. I won't stoop to their level, but I will maintain a strong, dignified resistance and always support my community. And continue to share my stories.

### Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I write stories that I love and I hope to find a connection with the readers. Each character comes from my heart. I describe them as fierce, fabulous, funny, and flawed. Their situations are sometimes funny, sad, serious, tragic, or all of them combined. Just like life.

I love to get direct feedback in the form of ratings and reviews. And I ask readers to send me photos of my books that I post on social media for "Where's My Book Wednesday."

### Q: What was your first thought when you started writing and when? What literary pilgrimages have you gone on?

For me, writing is a voyage across time and space, where the human being may find freedom, adventure, fulfillment, and joy. I didn't get good marks in school as a teenager. I would rather spend my days outside in nature. On the other hand, the teacher of Italian literature told my mother: "Alessandro will become a writer." My literary journeys have taken me from Hermann Hesse to Oriana Fallaci, through Paulo Cohelo and Tiziano Terzani.

### Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

To deceive aspiring authors with false promises of publication, extorting significant sums of money for works that will never be properly published and marketed, with the sole intention of taking advantage of them.

#### Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

Both. If there is inspiration at the beginning, the energy is enormous and drives me to write and write. The breaks are then used to take care of basic needs and go for a few runs in the woods to let off steam before starting again. However, at the end of the manuscript, due to the endless rereadings with the editor, I must admit that I was on the verge of a psychological breakdown.

### Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Instead of thinking about the outcome, writing should be a disinterested act of passion, an aesthetic endeavor inspired by profound listening to oneself. Then, using our capacity to convert ideas into feelings, we may enrich them with puns and amazing settings where the reader can dive in.

#### Q: Does a big ego help or hurt writers?

I believe that ego is a major flaw cultivated by human society to prevail over others, nature, and the animal world. Storytelling, whatever the theme it deals with, must always originate from inspiration. In my opinion, the presence of a strong ego is very limiting.

#### Q: What is your writing Kryptonite?

It is clear to me how detrimental it is to write without inspiration. It won't bring a good experience to the reader and risks producing useless works.

### Q: Have you ever experienced writer's block?

Yes, it's physiological. You just have to go out, breathe, run, live, laugh, and get over it.

### Q: Did you ever consider writing under a pseudonym?

No, although I did it once. I wrote a strong pamphlet on conformism. I used the

pseudonym as a shield, but now that I am older, I have no reservations about publishing anything under my own name. I don't see the meaning of using a stage name, but I have nothing to say if someone wants to do it.

### Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I write primarily for myself because writing gives me energy and nourishes my fantasies. It is only after that, that my focus shifts to the readers because of my desire to shake them, to make them discover new feelings, experiences, and possibilities.

### Q: Can someone be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

From what I said above, the answer comes by itself. Emotions, in my opinion, are the foundation of life and creativity. My emotions don't have to be extremely strong if they are compelling enough to give me the impulse to start a journey.

### Q: How did publishing your first book change your process of writing?

The unexpected publication of my first book, by an Italian (and international) publishing house called Europa Edizioni, gave me great satisfaction, but it didn't push me to write more. The desire to write new stories was born on its own, based on strong inspirations. The first publication, if anything, may have given me more confidence.

### Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

The idea of a book comes from intuition. After that, to feed my initial insight, I place my attention only on the coincidences, anecdotes, readings, emotions, and experiences of daily life. Next comes the vision of a character's actions and psychology. It is then that intuition and previous reflections take shape but only by letting go and completely freeing oneself in a sort of meditation, liberation, and rebirth, that the book comes to be.

### Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I'm working on my third book: Danit, the story of a rebellious girl who runs away from home with a thoroughbred horse she frees from captivity. Danit will have many adventures in the forests with her horse and the other companions she meets.

### Q: How do you feel about your book being listed by MODE?

I am pleased and flattered by DE MODE's interest in my work. A coincidence? I don't believe in coincidences ... when a meeting takes place, there is always a reason. Certain synchronicities should never be ignored. And if Carl Gustav Jung says so, we should reflect.



WITH AUTHOR HARRY MATTHEWS

### Q: What was your first thought when you started writing and when?

I wrote my first book in June 2020. It was simply to fill in the time. So, I suppose the answer was to cure boredom. I needed some activity to keep my mind off things. I wrote my latest book in July this year...My thought: I'm going to write this book about Nymphs; a dreamy pastoral collection, inspired by Shropshire.

### Q: What literary pilgrimages have you gone on?

I have been to Hereford on several literary pilgrimages with the Thomas Traherne Association, both at Hereford Cathedral and St Mary's Credenhill, also the Church in Teddington where he is buried. I could also mention Lawrence's Clouds Hill in Dorset. I happened to be at Rohet Gahr near Jodhpur once where Bruce Chatwin wrote a draft of 'The Songlines'.

### Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

Predatory publishers.

#### Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

I find painting energies me with an uplift. I do my own artwork for my books, and I find that really helps to sell the book and make it more interesting. If I write poetry, I feel inspired, and determined, but without sufficient rest after finishing the book, I am easily exhausted.

### Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Cliché and an inability to accept criticism are pitfalls. It is always good to read as a writer and write with a reader in mind. I learned a lot from my masters in writing, but I don't think they can teach how to write. One must read writers. I think focus and perseverance conquers most of the snares.

#### Q: Does a big ego help or hurt writers?

I think a writer needs an ego to survive in an ego driven world, but the less of the writer in the writing, the stronger the writing, especially in English.

#### Q: What is your writing Kryptonite?

Well I'm hardly a Superman, but I think that my Achilles heel is over-exerting myself; this always lands me in trouble and burnout is something I have to guard against or rest through! I think the cure is sometimes the poison and vice versa. Ginseng for instance, gives me focus, but it makes me garrulous and excitable! 57 words

#### Q: Have you ever gotten a reader's block?

Yes, quite a few times. I am hyperactive, but when I do focus, I have a depth of concentration that surprises me. There are a few books I should read, but I probably won't, but that's fine, I read when I can, and have several on the go at once.

### Q: Did you ever consider writing under a pseudonym?

Not seriously I considered a pseudonym: 'Perceval de Lillard'. My artist nom du guerre for a time was 'Hazman' but for writing I feel okay with my birth name.

### Q: Can someone be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

They could write, but I doubt it would have much impact. What interests me is that I learned language first from my mother by means of 'poetic devices'. If you can imagine it, and really feel it, and thereby describe it, then the reader will believe it and feel it too, and perhaps always remember it?

### Q: What's the best way to market your books?

Having a book is like having a website. It can be brilliant, so it better be presented to the right people, so it can take off.

### Q: How did publishing your first book change your process of writing?

Not much, except I now take longer to write. With the first book I drafted a poem or two a day every day for a month. I went straight to drafting, all the thinking and gathering in my memory; ideas reaching maturity after brewing for years. Draft, revise, edit. The Idylls took 4 months- I had doctoral research in tandem.

#### Q: How many unpublished and halffinished books do you have?

I have boxes full of them! I plan to get round to publishing a few more. The Amsterdam story has been with me since I was 22. It will probably be a massive tome. Then there is the ocean fantasy I've conceived as a trilogy. Then there many more poetry collections simmering nicely...

### Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?


I find I do plenty of research for my poetry collections in the academic library, especially around the theme that emerges. The Idylls required Classical research, and the bucolic poets such as Theocritus and Virgil who inspired me. I did research on coracles still used on the River Severn in Shropshire today. Being in a coracle is research.

### Q: How do you feel about your book being listed by MODE?

It's truly lovely. Writing each of my poetry books is hard work- I'm never sure it will reach the audience I hope for it. Being listed by DE MODE is a great feeling for me, because it means my collections of poems made it wider across the world and raised a laugh - which is really all I'm trying to do.
